Top 5 Technological Advancements That Changed the Glass Industry

1. Low-E Glass

Low-E was developed in the late 1960s, but it wasn't until the energy crisis of the 1970s that interest truly took off. By the 1980s, glass experts were calling this "the hottest news in windows," and it was being incorporated into nearly every type of product.

2. Impact-Resistant Products

With the development of laminated glass technology over the last few decades, architects have learned they can have all the beauty of decorative glass as well as solar control properties while bringing great daylight, and great views, into the most secure buildings.

3. Point-Supported Fittings.

In the 1960s, Pilkington devised a way of getting rid of the metal mullions traditionally used to frame glass. Since then, the world has been crazy for the barely there look of point-supported glass systems.

4. Structural Silicone Glazing.

Less remains more for architects, at least

when it comes to the metal framing around glass. Structural silicone joints have helped designers create a near seamless facade, without sacrificing performance, since the 1960s.

5. Warm-Edge Technology

When warm-edge spacers came onto the scene around 1990, they provided an alternative to traditional aluminum spacer systems and another possibility for improving insulating glass.

Protecting Your Eyes at Work

Eye injuries in the workplace are very common. The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) reports about 2,000 U.S. workers sustain job-related eye injuries that require medical treatment each day. However, safety experts and eye doctors believe the right



eye protection could have lessened the severity or even prevented 90% of these eye injuries.

Two major reasons workers experience eye injuries on the job are because they were: Not wearing eye protection, or wearing the wrong kind of protection for the job.

Simply using the proper eye protection on the job could prevent thousands of eye injuries each year. Common eye injuries occurring at work can result from chemicals or foreign objects in the eye and cuts or scrapes on the cornea. Other causes of injuries include splashes with grease and oil, burns from steam, ultraviolet or infrared radiation exposure, and flying wood or metal chips.

OEM UPDATE

Once we are certified, we will be able to supply glass to customers whose products are sold and marketed in Europe. Tempering is growing. Our sales are up for the fourth month in a row.

RESIDENTIAL UPDATE

The Window and Door Manufacturers Association's recently released Window and Entry Door 2015 U.S. Market Study shows continued growth for the residential window market through 2016. The study forecasts overall residential window market growth of 6.2 percent for 2015 and 3.9 percent for 2016. This follows market growth of 12.7 percent in 2014.

From a product mix standpoint, in 2014 vinyl windows made up nearly 68 percent of the residential market, followed by wood clad windows at 20.5 percent.

Just a friend reminder that it is extremely important for everyone to submit their time correctly. Not doing so will result in a delay in your pay no one wants that!




Field employees – Time must be called in to Kayleen Hammock daily. Time must

Quinoa Bars

1 cup of oats ½ cup flaked coconut ¾ cup honey ¼ tsp salt 1 cup quinoa
½ cup peanut butter
1 tbs veg oil
Chopped, dried fruit and nuts

Preheat oven to 350, Toast the oats, quinoa, coconut, on a wcookie sheet for 8 minutes and then place in large mixing bowl and add fruit and nuts. Melt peanut butter, honey, oil and salt over medium heat. Bring to a boil and immediately remove from heat. Pour over mixture and combine until evenly coated. Press mixture into 9"x13" parchment paper lined pan. Bake for 20 minutes, or until edges are brown. Let cool for 2 hours. Cut and serve.

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JUST FOR FUN

Too cool for school! 4 tips for making school lunches more fun!

Tip 1: Shape up those sandwiches
